The 2025 Africa Energy Summit in Tanzania underscored the urgency of addressing this issue and set forth an ambitious target through Mission 300, a program aimed at providing sustainable electricity to 300 million people by 2030. Achieving this goal requires substantial investment, coordinated policy efforts, and international cooperation. At the summit, following the lead of the World Bank and the African Development Bank, the Asian Infrastructure Investment Bank (AIIB) announced a \$1-1.5 billion contribution to Mission 300, reinforcing its commitment to Africa's infrastructure development. China FM to Visit Europe, U.S. Before G20 Talks in S. Africa

Chinese foreign minister Wang Yi will visit Europe and the United States this month before attending a Group of 20 meeting in South Africa, Beijing said on Monday. The announcement comes after Wang's U.S. counterpart Marco Rubio said he would skip the G20 talks over an "anti-American" agenda. US President Donald Trump has pulled his country out of multiple international organisations including the World Health Organization and the United Nations Human Rights Council since taking office last month. From February 12 to 17, Wang will visit Britain and Ireland and attend the Munich Security Conference in Germany before flying to Johannesburg for the G20 Foreign Ministers' Meeting, Chinese foreign ministry spokesman Guo Jiakun said at a regular briefing on Monday. With a landmass of 342,000 square kilometres, Congo-Brazzaville is dwarfed by China's vast 9.6 million-square-kilometre expanse. The country is also

often overlooked next to its larger neighbour, the Democratic Republic of Congo (DRC), which tends to capture greater scholarly and media attention due to its considerable mineral wealth and incessant turmoil—most recently having escalated in January 2025 with the Rwanda-backed M23's occupation of Goma.
