Kenya Sources Bulk of New KSh 68.7bn Loans From China

Kenya obtained 15 loans from China Development Bank, making it the main source of the cumulative KSh 68.7 billion the government borrowed from external bilateral and commercial lenders, between September and December last year. A significant chunk of the financing from China Development Bank will be used to upgrade/maintain roads such as a KSh 1bn loan to improve Cess (Nghonji) Rekeke Lake Jipe Road in Taita Taveta County, which will be repaid in 8 instalments from October 15 2027. The financing from bilateral lenders Germany, France and Italy will be used in setting up a National System Control Center of Electricity Grid, reforms, and to support a sustainable development budget.
