Presenting his government's 100-day progress report on Monday, Chapo revealed that Mozambique secured 100 million U.S. dollars in international support, with China contributing 68.5 million dollars -- by far the largest share, along with 21.2 million dollars from Japan and 11 million dollars from Sweden. Chad Receives Chinese Mobile Air Defense Systems From UAE

The United Arab Emirates (UAE) has transferred a pair of Chinese-made FK-2000 short-range air defense systems to Chad. The delivery is part of the UAE's ongoing military support for the African country. It includes 64 missiles and 6,000 rounds of 30mm ammunition, according to Military Africa. Developed by China Aerospace Science and Industry Corporation, the FK-2000 has a range of 25 kilometers (15.5 miles) and can reach an altitude of 12 kilometers (7.45 miles). The Defense Post.

China is set to reopen its embassy in Libya's capital, Tripoli, in the coming days, according to the Libyan-Chinese Joint Economic Chamber. In a statement, the chamber said the decision signals Beijing's support for Libya's stability and its commitment to strengthening political and economic ties between the two countries. The reopening was welcomed by the chamber, which described it as a "positive step" and a fresh start for deepening economic partnerships.
