Chinese firm set to 'significantly' increase Mozambique investment

Africa-focused Chinese firm Wangkang Holding Group proposed a set of new investments in Mozambique in a meeting with the country's president, reports Mozambican news agency AIM. Wangkang chairperson Zhong He Liu requested an audience with Mozambican President Daniel Chapo

to discuss "significantly" expanding his group's presence in the country, the agency said. One of his proposals centred on the establishment of a special economic zone in the district of Moamba, about 60 kilometres north of the Mozambican capital, where Wangkang opened a ceramics plant last September. Namibia parades Chinese UAV

The Namibian Defence Force (NDF) included what appeared to be a Chinese-made ASN-209 unmanned aerial vehicle (UAV) in its 65th anniversary parade at Grootfontein airbase on 2 June. A development on the ASN-206 UAV, which is typically used by the China's People's Liberation Army (PLA) to support artillery units, the ASN-209 has a twin-boom configuration with a pusher propeller and is launched from a truck-mounted rail using a rocket booster and recovered using a parachute, with skids helping to absorb the impact.
