The fourth China-Africa Economic and Trade Expo opened on Thursday in the central Chinese city of Changsha, highlighting the commitment of the world's largest developing country to strengthening ties with Africa, the continent with the largest number of developing nations. Chinese Foreign Minister Wang Yi attended the opening ceremony on Thursday, expressing the belief that the expo will create more opportunities for China-Africa cooperation and yield more results. China to remove tariffs on African imports to boost trade

The move, announced at a China-Africa co-operation meeting (FOCAC) in Changsha, central China, comes as the continent faces the possibility of increased tariffs on its products entering the US. The Asian economic giant already offers duty- and quota-free market access to least developed countries (LDCs), including 53 countries in Africa, but the new initiative will level the playing field by also offering middle-income countries similar market access. China continues to position itself as Africa's most important economic partner after offering tariff-free trade to all 54 African countries, other than Eswatini, which recognises Taiwan's sovereignty. The move, along with some jibes at United States policy, was announced at a ministerial meeting on China-Africa Cooperation in central China on 11 June that was attended by dozens of African ministers. It came alongside a ten-article declaration urging the international community to embrace 'true multilateralism' and stressing that development aid 'should be effectively increased, not unilaterally slashed'. African countries excluded as China expands visa-free transit to 55 nations

China's visa-free transit policy, which grants a 10-day stay for travelers in transit, now includes 55 countries but excludes all African nations—a move that has sparked disappointment and raised questions about Beijing's travel diplomacy and its Africa policy. The absence of African nations, despite China's strong economic and diplomatic ties across the continent, has surprised analysts and travel industry stakeholders alike. Business Insider.
